





# 1868: Prussian PO introduced «Open Cards» at reduced rate



# 1869: Austria & Hungary introduce domestic postal stationary postcard



... becomes a «bestseller», several million printed

Austria allows postcards in international mail in August 1870 (only to selected countries)



Postcard often only admissable at letter rate: Württemberg to Belgium 7 Kreuzer 1874


Folded letter with preprinted return adress and pre-payment – UK 1883

Folded double card. Postage still needs to be affixed for return, but adresse promises reimburseent –

# Harmonized rates (GPU 1875)



Not harmonized yet – Switzerland – France at 30 c letterrate (France did not sign the GPU convention effective 01.01.1876)



Harmonized before UPU – Switzerland – USA at 10 c postcard rate (rate effective by 01.05.1874, later adopted by GPU)



### 1<sup>st</sup> Reply cards in Germany: Reichspost, Bavaria & Württemberg


Berlin, December 23, 1871.

#### Notice

According to § 14 of the postal regulations of November 30, 1871, from January 1, 1872 onwards, correspondence cards with paid reply are introduced for mailing within the German Reich. For these correspondence cards special forms are issued to be obtained from all post offices of the Reich, of which the second half serve as a reply. The prespaid see for the message and the reply taken together is, without distinction of distance, are 2 Silbergroschen or 6 Rreuzer. The addressee, this is the person who has been assed to reply, can mail the part of the card, without regard to the currency of the postal stamp, as a franked correspondence card.

Following the above mentioned notice of today concerning the introduction of paid-reply correspondence cards, the following is stated:

- 1) The postal stamp on the second part of the form if to be cancelled only if this half is used as a reply.
- 2) In the traffic with Bavaria and Wurttemberg the use of the second part of the form as a response to another post areas, e.g. for the return on a correspondence card, which originated from Berlin and was addressed to Munich, the sending postal administration (in this case Bavaria) settles the postage rate for a simple franked letter as requirement under No. 1 of the postcard.

#### The Norway-Sweden Agreement 1879

- Norway joins UPU optional agreement 1879
- Sweden joins UPU optional agreement 1883
- Joint Norway-Sweden agreement 1879: domestic reply cards accepted mutually

Norway 1st domestic reply card at 2x6 Öre – rate from 01.01.1877 – 31.12.1884 - used in exchange with Sweden.

The card was initially mailed from Norway on 29.01.1883 and returned from Sweden on 19.02.1883. The double card is made up out of two cards with identical layout and inscription not mentioning the specific purpose.





### Confusion during the «Optional Period»



1879 Norway 10 Öre posted for return from Great Britain on 30.12.1881: Since Great Britain did not join the «Special Convention» until 1883 the card was rejected according to UPU rules and marked «Not Transmissible Abroad».



To Brazil from the UK on 23.03.1883: Brazil did not join the special agreement for the mutual acceptance of reply cards until 21.05.1884. Marked the card as «not transmissible to».

### Confusion during the «Optional Period»



German reply card returned 18.11.1879 (Julian) from Russia. The German incipium was not accepted for payment, since Russia did not join the «special agreement» and not acceped foreign reply card before 1886. The card was then uprated by 3 Kopecks for the international postcard rate. Rejected again, another 4 Kopecks were added to cover the 7 Kopecks UPU letter rate.




Same card, same countries, still not 1886 yet – no trouble.

### 1885 Lisbon & 1891 Vienna

- 1885: all members must accept reply cards in incoming mail as for return
- 1891: all member must issue reply cards and allow sending them


